THE LITTER PROBLEM

The county has been pushing its <u>anti-litter campaign</u> since 2019, and it doesn't seem to be getting any better. The County Council had a representative from the state come to talk about the issue last January. Will Pines (SHA) said we have the most state roadways, rank #2 for money spent on litter mitigation, and were responsible for 19% of all the litter picked up in the state, and that's just on state roads.

Some of the <u>causes of littering</u> include a lack of personal responsibility, laziness, no sense of community, or a lack of law enforcement. Trash/recycling trucks can add to the issue when garbage blows out of the back, unnoticed by the driver. Add to that, litter breeds litter. Uncaring people see the litter already on the road and think nothing of adding to the piles.

It is a difficult problem to fix because the people who care about the community are not the cause of the problem. In our own neighborhood, we can participate in the MNA Cleanup Days. Otherwise, reporting the issues to the proper authority is the best practice. The county is encouraging residents to use the 311 system to report litter on county property and roads. The state is responsible for cleaning up numbered roads like Rt 301.

COUNTY STRUGGLING TO PAY FOR BLUEPRINT

PG County has a problem. The county budget is in a deficit. While the Blueprint for Maryland's Future was well-intentioned, the 2021 law has placed an enormous burden on the county to increase school funding above the maintenance of effort and above what the county can afford. It's not just PG County, either. Every county in Maryland is struggling to figure out how to find the money the Blueprint demands we find for the local school systems.

Alsobrooks came up with a scheme to try to plug the budget holes. She has asked the state to pass a couple of bills that will change how some school funding is counted. The county has two different taxes that are earmarked for the schools but do not count toward the county's required Blueprint spending. Alsobrooks has asked the MD legislature to allow those revenue streams to count towards the Blueprint spending.

Councilman Dernoga wrote in an email explaining the move: "82% of the County budget is for PGCPS and public safety. Other items that you really cannot cut are Community College and debt service (another 7%). So, \$210 million has to be cut from the 11% of what's left: libraries, environment, permitting, code enforcement, social services, health department, grants to nonprofit organizations, etc. This is not hyperbole. It's math. All options are bad. If one cannot cut education, public safety, or debt service, the remaining options are frightening."

According to NewsBreak: "Many elected officials attribute the looming \$183 million deficit Prince George's County faces next year to the hefty price tag of the Blueprint, insinuating that reallocating funds could address this financial strain. But others quietly suggest this is a move to assist Alsobrooks image for her senatorial campaign by filling the budget gaps from overspending and keep the county's AAA Bond Rating."

BAG_it RIGHT

in Prince George's County

Effective January 1, 2024, Prince George's County prohibits a retail establishment from providing a plastic carryout bag to shoppers and, with certain exceptions*, must charge and retain at least 10 cents for each paper carryout or reusable bag provided to a customer.

WHY THE BAN?

To protect the environment, marine life and reduce litter.

WHO IS AFFECTED?

All retail stores, restaurants, grocery stores, or any other establishment that provides single-use plastic bags to its customers as a result of the sale of a product, or service whether for-profit or not-for-profit.

BAG BILL GUIDELINES

What is allowed

Stores and restaurants shall use/sell paper bags or reusable bags at a 10-cent fee.

"Reusable carryout bag" means a bag with stitched handles specifically designed and manufactured for multiple reuse and is made of: Cloth or other washable fabric; Or a durable material suitable for multiple re-use that is not made of plastic film.



Exceptions

Plastic bags used to: Package bulk items, including fruit, vegetables, nuts, grains, candy, or small hardware items; Wrap frozen foods, meat, or fish, whether prepackaged or not; Wrap flowers, potted plants, or other damp items; Contain unwrapped prepared foods or bakery goods; Protect or contain garments or dry-cleaned clothes; protect suits, dresses, and formal wear; Take live fish, insects, mollusks, or crustaceans away from the retail store.

Charge for paper bags used to: Contain pharmacy prescriptions; Package prepared food provided at the drive-through window; and Provided by a full-service restaurant after a meal for leftovers.





Reminder to Local Realtors

Maryland State Law requires that you tell all buyers and potential buyers that covenants govern most homes in the Marlton subdivision and that adherence is mandatory. Many people choose Marlton because we have covenants, but far too many purchasers find out after the fact that there are restrictions on what can be done to properties in Marlton.

Covenant Reminder For Owners

Most Marlton homes are subject to covenants that detail what external improvements may be made to homes and properties. If your property is so encumbered, then you must receive approval from the appropriate covenant group before making any external changes on your home or property.
